Gender split 51% female and 49% male.

Go Card is a concessionary card which can be used throughout leisure and culture facilities for free or discounted access to a range of services and activities.

Active Forth

The Active forth programme is Falkirk exercise referral programme it provides guidance and support to inactive individuals with health conditions to help them increase physical activity and understand how best to exercise for them while managing the specifics needs of their health and wellbeing. The programme aims to assist people into independent exercise over a 6 month period. Working closely with NHS health providers the programme is a key link into community-based exercise to improve health and wellbeing.

Social - case studies; personal / group feedback / other

Council carried out a series of public consultation meetings and online surveys for communities to provide feedback on SPR proposal. Email correspondence was also accepted.

4 emails received.

Poverty - 2 responses - Negative impact on low income families, concern over increased activity charges, cost to travel to an alternative venue, potential to remove of Go Card concessionary pricing and negative impact on mental and physical health.

Disability - 1 response - Impact on disadvantaged groups using the gym for rehabilitation.

Gender - Female predominant provider of childcare with limited time to travel for fitness.

266 Survey responses received from users of the facility (215), resident of the ward (49), on behalf of a community group /organisation (1), not answered (1).

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Gender of responses received - female 174, male 85, not answered 6.

213 respondents stated they would be disproportionately affected by the SPR proposal for this venue.

The age profile of respondents

Under 16 - 3 responses, 16 - 24 years -13 responses, 25 - 44 years - 103 responses, 45- 64 years - 121 responses. 65+ years - 22 responses, not answered - 4 responses

The majority of the responses received did not select a protected characteristic when completing the survey.

Summary of comments received:

Negative impact on health & wellbeing, social engagement, people with disabilities having access to suitable adapted facilities, age discrimination, ability to travel to an alternative venue, public transport network, affordability, lack of capacity in other venues for those that are able to travel were the most common concerns raised.

Summary of responses stating protected characteristics:

DISABILITY - 23 responses, 20 state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 23 responses, 14 are female and 8 male, 1 not answered. 45 - 64 years received the most responses with 9, closely followed by 25 - 44 years with 8 responses. Under 16 years is the only age category not to respond.

Suitability of location and access to the venue, negative impact on health and wellbeing and the ability to travel to an alternative venue if it were to close were the most common concerns raised. Concerns over social engagement and affordability were are also noted.

AGE - 22 responses, 9 state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 22 responses, 14 are female and 7 male, 1 not answered. 45 - 64 years received the most responses with 10, closely followed by 65+ years with 7 responses, Under 16 years is the only age category not to respond.

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Negative impact on physical health, recovery from medical conditions, mental health and general well being were the most common concerns raised were the venue to close. Concern over access, travel, affordability, social engagement were also noted.

SEX - 11 responses, 5 state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 11 responses 9 are female and 2 male. 25 - 44 years received 8 responses and 45 - 64 years received the remaining 3 responses.

Suitability of location within the local community, ability to walk to venue and ability to travel to an alternate location was the most popular response received. Concerns over impact on general physical health, affordability, mental health and general wellbeing and social interaction were also noted.

MARITAL STATUS - 11 responses, 5 state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. Of the 11 responses, 9 are female and 2 male. 45 - 64 years received 6 responses closely followed by 25 - 44 years with 5 responses.

Venue has a positive impact on the community and its ability to stay local by walking to or short travel to the gym, the venue is well used by all age groups encouraging physical activity and active lifestyle were the most common points noted. Concerns over physical health of the community, ability to travel to an alternative location and affordability were also noted.

POVERTY - 7 responses, 2 state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer than 12 months. of the 7 responses 5 are female and 2 male. 16 - 24 years and 25 - 44 years received 2 responses and 45 - 64 years receiving 1 response.

Affordability and ability to travel to an alternative venue were the concerns raised were the venue to close. Concerns a different operating model, price structure and removal of Go Card concessionary pricing were also noted.

SEXUAL ORIENTATION - 6 responses, 5 state they have a physical or mental health condition expected to last longer that 12 months. Of the 6 responses 5 are female and 1 male. 3 recognise as Bi Sexual, 2 Gay / Lesbian, 1 Heterosexual. The 25 - 44 years and 45 - 64 years received 3 responses each.

Suitability of location and affordability were the most common responses were this venues to close. Concerns over mental health, social engagement and disability access were also noted.

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PREGNANT / MATERNITY - 3 responses, received from females in the 25 - 44 years.

Suitability of location, ability to travel to an alternative venue, physical& mental health and affordability were the concerns raised were this venue to close.
